Reading

- Comment on the way characters relate to one another.
- Know which words are essential in a sentence to retain the meaning.
- Draw inferences such as inferring characters' feelings, thoughts and motives from their actions.
- · Recognising some different forms of poetry
- Predicting what might happen from details stated and implied
- Use dictionaries to check the meaning of words.
- Listen to and discuss a wide range of fiction, non-fiction, poetry, plays and reference books.
- Participate in discussion about both books that are read to them and those they can read for themselves, taking turns and listening to what others say.
- Discussing words and phrases that capture the reader's interest and imagination
- Retrieve and record information from non-fiction.
- Read further exception words and apply growing knowledge of root words, prefixes and suffixes.
- Read for pleasure, independently.



Writing

- Use conjunctions (e.g. when, so, before, after, while, because).
- Use adverbs (e.g. then, next, soon).
- Use prepositions (e.g. before, after, during, in, because of).
- Use fronted adverbials
- Choose plurals, pronouns and collective nouns appropriately
- place the possessive apostrophe accurately in words with regular plurals [for example, girls', boys'] and in words with irregular plurals [for example, children's]
- Experiment with adjectives to create impact.
- Draft and write by composing and rehearsing sentences aloud.
- In narratives, create settings, characters and plot.
- Use perfect form of verbs to mark relationships of time and cause,
 e.g. He has gone out to play.
- Use inverted commas to punctuate direct speech.
- Group ideas into basic paragraphs.
- Write under headings and sub-headings.
- Write with increasing legibility, consistency and fluency.
- ♦ Join letters correctly when writing.
- Proof read for spelling and punctuation and to ensure that work makes sense.
- Create characters, settings and plot in narratives.
- Use 'a' or 'an' appropriately.
- Recognise how commas are used to give more meaning.
